

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## **Southern Conference & Herd Tour 2014**

The 2014 Herd Tour was this year hosted by Otago / Southland Breeders. The Tour began on Friday 11th of April with people arriving at Queenstown either by car, being met at the airport by Southern Breeders 'taxi service' or even by motorbike.

The Council meeting was held during the afternoon, with an informal dinner in the evening at the Goldridge Resort Hotel. This gave people a chance to meet and chat prior to the next few busy days ahead.

Registrations began at 8.30am Saturday morning, with the National AGM following at 10am. Sunday  $12^{\text{th}}$  April saw us on the road to Roxburgh, over the Roxburgh dam to Neil McKerchars Flemington

Belted stud.

These are cows at work and spending time amongst the rocks and hills of scenic Roxburgh. Neil had his cows close to the road where they were easy to see. Some people were amazed at the number of cows on display and the country they were running on.



From there we travelled through fruit growing country to Ettrick, past the Iconic Ettrick Store where the Toyota Hilux ads are filmed, via Moa Flat to Kelso. Adam and Georgina McCall run their Paradise Flat Belted Stud here in conjunction with their dairy operation. Here we also saw a monument to the devastating Kelso



floods that led to the abandonment of the township in the early 1980s. McCall's cattle are run in paddocks that can flood quickly and often. They had on display a lot of Dun Belted cattle and their leading sire Lilliesleaf Aaron 519 (a Dun Belted son of Okiwa Frank).

# Stoney Brook Stud

# Richard & Sue Dyson ~ White Galloways



We came to New Zealand in 2002, with Richard's work in Oil & Gas for a new gas development off the coast of Taranaki. Upon completion of the project in 2007, instead of packing everything up in to a 20' container and moving country again, we decided to put some roots down and purchased approximately 10 acres of land just outside of New Plymouth.



The next question was what to put on the land, Sue started to look at Dexter's and we were quite enthusiastic about the prospect of having a few in the paddocks around the house. During the summer of 2008/09, due to a family illness, Richard had to return to the UK. Whilst there, Sue went to a local Dexter meeting to check them out. By the time Richard returned Dexter's were out and Galloways were in !!!

We set off to see Lorraine Clifford's Lifestyle stud. However, by this time most of her herd had been dispersed. Whilst visiting, Lorraine put us in touch with Bob and Karen Curry and their Suncrest Arctic stud.

We eventually purchased 6 cows from Bob and Karen, 3 mixed aged and 3 heifers. At long last we had White Galloways to look at in our paddocks and became members of the Galloway Society in July 2009. In subsequent years we have purchased 2 heifers from Kelvin & Juan Whittington's Whitby stud.

During our first three years of breeding we only produced bulls! Our second years off spring producing these three below:

So we now know what colour patterns these White Galloways come in! And just to complicate matters further, the well-marked white is from a black appendix, the black is from a slightly under marked white and the under-marked white was from a well-marked white! We had lots of locals doing a double take thinking the calves were suckling on the wrong mums!!!




Wow what have we got ourselves in to, this has certainly stimulated Richard's interest in the Galloway genetics.

We are self-confessed 'townies' with no background in farming what so ever. We are still on a huge, but enjoyable, learning curve having attended small holder lifestyle courses for basic knowledge in animal husbandry, fencing, chain sawing, quad bike ownership, land management etc, and still spend many an hour talking with local farmers, friends and vets to obtain further knowledge, and of course nothing beats learning's from your own mistakes.....which are aplenty!!!

In 2013 we purchased approximately 6 acres from a neighbour as a boundary change, this has helped us to increase our herd number and at long last we have Stoney Brook heifers to include in our herd. Our first few years of breeding was via Al using mainly Glacier White Xpress. The last couple of years we have leased Totaranui Frankie and we are currently looking to purchase a bull for future use.

We have a good market for our bulls selling to dairy farmers, and have managed to sell other stock to life stylers. We are looking forward in the future to being able to sell-on our progeny to fellow breeders.



# Using Belted Galloway Beef Bulls Over Dairy's ... from a dairy farmers point of view.

**Our** old policy of buying or leasing bulls, was to use 2 Jersey bulls on the heifers and 2 Hereford bulls over the herd, possibly leasing 2 or more.

We had tried Angus bulls because calving became easier than Hereford, but found a lack of colour marking led to a risk of calves being kept as replacements. A mistake we once made and one we learnt from.

This meant that heifers had to be kept separate from the mature cows to ensure no resulting calves were kept as replacements due to mis-mothering. Also, Angus calves had very little value as bobby calves at the time, because no one else

wanted them. However, Angus did have one big advantage; it had a shorter gestation period, therefore tightening the calving pattern.

Even now the breakdown between AB calves and Belted Galloway calves allows us to clean up the calf shed mid season. We have used Dunn Belted Galloway's but found that we had some solid coloured calves and even the Dunn belted calves were not as attractive to calf rearers or life style blocks. Also strangely hairier but maybe that was just the sire. After this we tried the White Galloway but about 25% of these were completely black.

About 2003 we came across Belted Galloway Bulls and in the first mating year we were impressed with the ease of training to come out of the cow yard, the strength of their legs, cunningness of beating the Herefords to the girls, ruggedness and the lower cost of mating cows.

When it came to the end of calving after AB had finished, there came a lull of only a few Hereford calves dropping and then after almost a week, a flood of little 'cute' Belted Galloway calves with 1 or 2 Hereford calves thrown in the mix. It should have dawned on me then, that Belties have a longer gestation period but that in fact took a few years to sink in. We found the colour markings excellent to avoid confusion and that these cheeky little calves soon found a ready market with repeat customers.

Loving the ease of calving, rearing, character and pasture clean up capabilities, they are a great animal to combine with horses. Although slow to mature, like fine wine, the taste is well worth the wait.

Having committed ourselves to the use of Belted Galloway bulls, we found sourcing bulls became more difficult as 'Pure' Galloways turned up on Trade Me and more dairy farmers discovered the advantages of using the pedigree animal. So we started to get to know some of the members of the society and then Susan became an Associate Member and she is now a breeder herself.

The findings over the last 11 years, is that 18 months to 2 year old bulls are better over the dairy heifers, but sourcing them can be hard. So if you are able to winter mate these, it could be an attractive sale to dairy farmers for your bulls. We winter the bulls over with the dairy herd, not only adding our 'Bull' paddock to the round but the bulls identify any slips or on heat cows so we can deal with them early.

When the bulls have to come out of the heifers and cows, usually 1 Jan, they can be surprising economical on feed so we can allocate them a paddock that needs tidying up in Autumn and use lower quality supplement during the drought instead of culling the bulls every year. They are very fast to establish dominant rankings to the extent that there is very little fighting. It helps to keep the obviously dominant bull, much to the disadvantage of any lease bulls we may have to get. The Belties tend to work as a team when a new bull, of a different breed, is introduced even when the Belties are smaller.

After 2 years of age the carcase weight of the beefy gets much closer as the Beltie matures, even if the stature of the Beltie is much shorter. Our home kill butcher has also said that they don't seem to suffer the same "knock" to quality of meat if you have to carry through the next dry summer and you're not ready for more meat in the freezer.

Since the National Dairy herd has changed mainly to X breed (Jersey/Friesian), from what used to be a Friesian base, there are a lot less pure bred Friesian bull calves available for the Hawkes Bay Bull Beef Growers. So they have moved to white headed animals. These are now in shorter supply so they are rearing the calves.

Although not at a premium, bull rearers have reported that the Galloways are being successful on the rougher blocks and are a lot hardier to carry through the winter, offering an option where Herefords are not thriving.

Our presence at AGM's and our membership to the Galloway Society, has given us a lot of information and

opened our eyes to the great variety of reasons to be a breeder and the massive range of what people want from breeding programmes: anything from a tall, strong, economical, well marked, easy calving and saleable calves from our Dairy cows, to people who want compact, hardy, stand alone beef animals, to prime good looking stock to make use of small acreages. Roll on the next AGM!

Lastly, Susan and Eric would like to thank the Southland Breeders for the fine effort that was put into the AGM. We had a lot of fun and I'm sure I speak for all of the attendees in saying this. Thank you!

Holli has taken to them so much that 'Lifestyle Bubbles' our 10 year old, now features on her car boot PSP advertisement (see far right of wheel cover).








## Faye~Marie's Sticky Date Pudding

Pre-heat oven to 180C. Melt butter and sugar, add vanilla and egg and beat for one minute. Sift flour and baking powder and mix in until just mixed. Put aside in a warm place.

Place water, dates and apricots in a pot and bring to the boil. Once it boils, remove from heat and stir in the baking soda. Add this frothy mixture to the batter, and mix until all combined. Line 20cm round baking tin with baking paper and pour in mixture. bake 50 to 60 minutes. Test with skewer in middle. Cool in pan.

Once cooled, place on serving plate and sprinkle with icing sugar. Serve sliced with caramel sauce and a dollop of whipped cream.

#### **CARAMEL SAUCE**

(I normally double this recipe)

Melt 2 tbsp butter in saucepan and add 2 tbsp brown sugar, 1 tbsp golden syrup and 2 tbsp condensed milk. Stir over medium heat until mixture is thick and leaves the sides. Remove from heat and add 4 tbsp hot water, a little at a time. Return to heat, simmer and stir for 2-3 minutes until smooth. Pour into serving jug. If a thin caramel sauce is desired, add 2 more tbsp water.

This sauce is delicious on ice-cream, waffles, cakes and steamed puddings. The cake is Really nice just as a cake too.


