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
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Gorgeous Galloways 2017 Calendar ... is now available

Just before the AGM weekend, Marie and I spent 3 weeks visiting our son Blair, his wife Kelly and their son Lincoln in Tom Price, Western Australia. We drove a few thousand km's in a big loop from Tom Price north to Broome for four days then south down the coast to Karatha and then Coral Bay and back to Tom Price. Both Blair and Kelly work in an Iron Ore mine in Engineering and Quality Control.

Of course the way of life in another country is always interesting in particular farming. This is very different to what we are use to with Stations measured in square miles and very little green grass.

The cattle we saw were Brahman, or Brahman cross.

There is very little in the way of road side fencing with main highways running though the middle of many Stations and small groups of cattle standing in the shade under a tree or wandering across the road. There are no grass paddocks as we know, just the natural very thin bush with a bit of green here and there and the odd water hole or creek bed to drink from.

You really see the need for Bull Bars on all the utes and road trains. We saw quite a few dead cattle on the side of the road that have been hit by trucks. At one point we saw a very large four trailer iron ore Road Train completely upside down on the side of the road with 2 dead cows in front of it. The huge area of this part of the world is hard to describe when 200 km is considered just down the road.





The southern breeders have implemented a trial scheme of inspecting all stud stock prior to sale. It has been implemented for a 2 year trial basis. All stock male and female are to be inspected by a member of our inspection team before they can be sold as registered stud stock. The aim of this scheme is to protect new breeders, through ensuring only sound stock are sold.

Once again there was a great demand for our bulls from the dairy industry. There was a full clearance of bulls this year, with some prospective clients having to be turned away. It is a strength of our group that we can work together to ensure as many orders for bulls can be filled by working together.

Lochurr Galloways

by Richard Kennedy-Moffat, Hawera

I have read in the Taranaki Daily News (7th Jan 2016) of a forthcoming Galloway Cattle AGM to be held in Taranaki in April 2016.



The article mentioned that the first Galloway arrived in New Zealand in 1947. That perked up my interest as it was my father, Tommy Kennedy-Moffat, who exported that first Galloway to Mr Winkler at Massey University, Palmerston North.

I am not a farmer (retired ex-retailer) and have lived in Hawera since 1968. I did work on the family farm in my youth doing lambing beats and rebuilding stone dykes, but as there were a sufficient number of employees already engaged in tractor work, shepherding, cattlework, etc, I was a bit superfluous and it was not done to interfere with Scottish time given traditions.

I worked on a Hereford & Southdown Stud at Raetihi (O'Neills) in 1964 and the comments from other cattle breeders, was that they needed to be wary of Galloways as they had a foot/hoof problem. I think that was quickly eliminated. At the time I was employed there, I was engaged in bringing wool bales down the Wanganui River from Kahura Station to Pipiriki. At the time I visited Galloway studs at Blenheim, Raetihi, and Peak Hill – from where I crossed the Rakaia River and visited Mt Algidus Station.

My brother Peter (a certified Galloway judge) astutely ran the family farms — Lochurr, Craigenvey and Shillingland in Dumfriesshire after my father died. The farms are now run by his second son lain.

There are now three breeds of Galloway Cattle. It would seem that the breeds are generally assumed to be under one breed 'umbrella' – although I do not know the specific facts in New Zealand. What I do know, was that many years ago the 'Belted Galloway' and the 'Black Galloway' were two distinct breeds and no pedigree breeder would be seen to have both

breeds on his property at one time. It just wasn't done!

As requested, here is a short history of what I know of my Moffat family in Scotland.

Alexander Moffat (born 1688 - my 6 x gt grandfather) lived in Lochurr and maybe generations before him – we don't know. The farm stayed in the family until John Moffat died in 1911 at Lawrence in Otago. Why he came to New Zealand is unknown.



The farm was sold, but in 1919 my grandfather William Kennedy-Moffat (a distant cousin of John Moffat) purchased Lochurr back again, along with Craigenvey and Shillingland – and other farms too.


LOCHURR GALLOWAYS: written by T.W. Kennedy-Moffat, Galloway Journal No:11, Dec 1963

When my father acquired Lochurr in 1919 he decided to put on a herd of Galloway's in what he considered to be ideal Galloway cattle country. Previously the only cattle on the farm had been cross-heifers, sent from lower farms for summering.

My father's first purchases were made at Mr James Carlyle's dispersal sale at Dunnabie in May 1920, and he bought three that day, one of which was Trusty 2nd, for which he paid 50 guineas. She left some good calves, and her blood was last represented in the herd by Tabitha 3rd of Lochurr, who was put away in 1957. Unfortunately her last three calves were bulls. Now the only representatives of the old "Trusty" kind that I know of are from Teresa 3rd, who are with Colonel George Daniels, Forest Range Ranch, in California.


In all my father bought 12 heifers in 1920 to start the herd, but none of the progeny of the others had any lasting influence. Again in 1922, my father attended a sale for which the cover of the catalogue read:

From the Galloway Journal in the 1960's



"Grange Farm, Dalbeattie, N.B., on Saturday 4th November 1922, at 1 o' clock prompt. William Wallet, Auctioneer." The catalogue also added that a motor char-a-banc (often pronounced "sharra-bang" it is a type of horse-drawn vehicle or early motor-coach, usually open-topped, common in Britain during the early part of the 20th century) would meet the forenoon and mid-day trains at Castle Douglas.

At this sale my father bought two of his most successful breeding heifers, Grange Gaiety, for 35 guineas, and Grange Lizzie 2nd. The latter does not appear in the sale catalogue. Gaiety is the founder of all the G's, A's and S's, and Lizzie of all the L's in the herd, as it is the custom to try and stick to the initial letters of the dams when naming the calves. There were many other heifers bought, but these mentioned above are the only ones of the original set-up with any influence in the herd today.

Newspaper Obituary for William Kennedy-Moffat:

William **KENNEDY-MOFFAT** Mr Kennedy Moffat devoted himself energetically to the management of his estate and to the breeding of Blackfaced and Cheviot sheep and of Galloway Cattle, and as a breeder, he was highly skilled and knowledgeable. As a result his stock became far-famed and was exhibited with great success both at local shows and at the Highland and the Royal. At the Galloway Cattle show and sale held annually at Castle Douglas his stock was presented with consistent success.

Lochurr was one of the most successful 'black' Galloway studs in Scotland due mainly to long-standing staff who were passionate about the breed. Many championship prizes were won by Lochurr Galloway's both at Royal, Highland and local shows. As previously stated, in 1947 the Lochurr Herd of pedigree 'black' Galloway's exported the first Galloway Cattle to Mr Winkler at Massey University, New Zealand. More were to follow to this country in later years. To Hunt's at Wanaka, Grigg's at Blenheim and Littlejohn's at Wanganui. Other cattle exports from Lochurr went to the U.S.A, Canada, Argentina, Kenya, and South Africa.

The Lochurr Herd was the first to sell a pedigree animal in the U.K. at over £1,000 in the 1950's. Tommy was interviewed on BBC radio at the time about the sale. It was big news.

A MEMORIAL:

A Silver Salva was presented by the Kennedy-Moffat family as a memorial to T.W. Kennedy-Moffat, to be competed for at the Scottish National Fatstock Club, Edinburgh. **Category: Champion Galloway**

The breeding of pedigree 'black' Galloway's at Lochurr ceased in the 1990's mainly due to cost, the time required for producing show cattle, and also the horrific problems caused by foot and mouth disease at the time, however, the pedigree Galloway herd was started up again in 2012 by my nephew lain Kennedy-Moffat, by purchasing from Blackcriag and Kirkstead with two homebred females.


