On that note, I hope everyone in the Society enjoys the festive season and looks forward to the New Year. Take care everyone.



- b) The DNA Profile Number shall be forwarded to the Registrar for entering into the Society's Herdbook.
- c) All Breeder Members expressly give their consent, upon request. To supply a copy of the full DNA Profile to the Society.
- d) In any dispute over parentage, the Society reserves the right to have additional DNA Testing undertaken at the Breeder Member's expense.
- e) The Society recommends DNA Testing of all registered cattle (Sire and Dams) owned by Breeder Members, with DNA Profile Number being supplied to the Registrar for entering intro the Society's Herdbook.

This in an extract from the Canadian Galloway Advance magazine from 1994.

Interesting reading

A Brief Historical Outline of Galloway, Belted Galloway, and White Galloway Registration in Canada

compiled by Hugh R. Crawford, Carmangay, Alberta

- 1853 First importation of Galloway cattle to North America by Messrs. Graham, Vaughan, Ontario
- 1863 Galloway breeders meet in Toronto to organize a registry for Galloway cattle in Ontario
- 1866 First importation of Galloway cattle to the United States. The animals were bred by John Snell, Chinguacousy, Ontario and purchased by Michigan State College, Lansing, Michigan.
- 1872 First registration of Galloway cattle in Canada in the Ontario Galloway Herd Book.
- 1874 American Galloway breeders start to use the Ontario Galloway Herd book.
- 1882 Canadian and American Galloway breeders unite to form the North American Galloway Association. (Incorporated under the Ontario, "Agricultural and Arts Act', 1882.)
- 1883 Volume One of the North American Galloway Herd Book is published containing 1,302 entries including those previously recorded. The Graham importation of 1853 became Galloways -1-through -10-. The Snell exportation of 1866 became -80- and -122-
- 1902 American Galloway breeders form their own American Galloway Breeders' Association. (Incorporated under the Illinois, 'Act Governing Corporations', 1872.) Volume One of the North American Galloway Herd Book became Volume One of the American Galloway Herd Book.
- 1905 Canadian Galloway breeders incorporate the North American Galloway Association under the Canada, 'Live Stock Pedigree Act', 1900. The Constitution stipulated a closed Herd Book with registrations and transfers handled by Canadian National Live Stock Records.
- 1931 The North American Galloway Association becomes inactive and, thus, by the Live Stock Pedigree Act, is wholly administered by the Canadian National Live Stock Records Committee. Membership, registrations, and transfers were not effected by the transfer of authority.
- 1939 The name of the North American Galloway Association is changed to the Canadian Galloway Association.
- 1939 Volume One of the Canadian Galloway Herd book is published containing Galloway pedigrees -1303- through -3032-. (For entries -1- through -1302- refer to Volume One of the North American Galloway Herd Book, 1883.)
- 1952 First importation of Belted Galloway cattle to Canada from Great Britain and the U.S.A. by H. Gordon Green, Ormstown, Quebec.
- 1956 First importation of dun Galloway cattle to Canada from Scotland by Orin Hart, Claresholm, Alberta.
- 1957 The Canadian Galloway Association is re-activated under the Live Stock Pedigree Act with a revised Constitution. The revised Constitution again stipulates a closed Herd Book with two significant changes from 1905:
 - a.) Belted Galloways are to be entered in an Appendix to the Herd Book. Belted Galloway X Galloway crosses are not registerable.
 - b.) Galloways registered with the American Galloway Breeders' Association are eligible for Canadian registration only with three or more generations of recorded purebred ancestry.
- 1962 Volume Two of the Canadian Galloway Herd Book is published containing Galloway pedigrees -3033- through -6045- and Belted Galloway pedigrees -1B- through -31B-. The Green importation of Belted Galloways in 1952 became entries -1B- and -2B-.
- 1965 First red Galloway registered with the Canadian Galloway Association 'Galair Red Hazel -8333-'. Her sire was imported from Scotland and her dam was three-quarters full Scottish blood-lines.

Canadian Galloway Advance — 1994

- 1966 First importation of American White Galloway cattle to Canada by Jim Airth, DeWinton, Alberta.
- 1968 Volume Three of the Canadian Galloway Herd Book is published containing Galloway pedigrees -6046- through -9272- and Belted Galloway pedigrees -32B- through -89B-.
- 1968 Amendment to the Constitution: All foreign registries must document five full generations of purebred ancestry to be eligible for entry in the Canadian Galloway Herd Book.
- 1970 Galloway Performance International is incorporated in Eureka, Kansas. This new American Association is computerized, performance oriented, and regards Galloways, Belted Galloways, and White Galloways as one breed. White Galloways are offered full purebred status regardless of ancestry or coloration and without inspection or documentation. (Registration starts at number 200,000 in the G.P.I. Herd Book.)
- 1972 White Galloways in Canada (American source) start to register with Galloway Performance International. The first are 'White Heather 1 201089' and 'White Heather 2 201090'.
- 1973 American Galloway Breeders' Association and Galloway Performance International merge as American Galloway Breeders' Association. The two registries are combined and the American Galloway Breeder's Association thus inherits both the White Galloways and the approach that Galloways, Belted Galloways, and White Galloways are one breed.
- 1973 First dun Belted Galloway registered with the Canadian Galloway Association — Gallwen Mark Substance 10th -354B- 1003. He was imported by Robert Marshall, Blyth, Ontario from the U.S.A.
- 1979 Volume Four of the Canadian Galloway Herd Book is published containing Galloway pedigrees -9273- through -14000- and Belted Galloway pedigrees -90B- through -683B-.
- 1979 Amendment to the Constitution: Random verification of parentage through blood-typing is implemented.
- 1987 Amendment to the Constitution: Properly belted Belted Galloway X Galloway crosses are eligible for entry in a new Appendix to the Herd Book.
- 1988 Volume Five of the Canadian Galloway Herd Book is published containing Galloway pedigrees -14001 through -15849- and Belted Galloway pedigrees -684B- through -1210B-.
- 1988 Amendments to the Constitution:
 - a.) The Herd Book is divided into 'Section I: Galloways' and 'Section II: Belted Galloways'. Properly belted Belted Galloway X Galloway crosses are eligible for entry into an Appendix to 'Section II'.
 - b.) Animals with, or carriers of, deleterious genetic abnormalities are ineligible for registration.
- 1990 Amendment to the Constitution: A 'Section III: White Galloways' is added to the Canadian Galloway Herd Book. Foundation animals are subject to inspection and documentation of ancestry. Properly marked White Galloway X Galloway crosses are eligible for entry in 'Section III: White Galloways' with foundation animals.
- 1991 First American source White Galloways entered in 'Section III: White Galloways' of the Canadian Galloway Herd Book. The first is 'Galair White Heather 4 (Blk) -1W- FS'.
- 1991 Amendments to the Constitution: Rules of eligibility are altered to exclude:
 - a.) Scottish animals with up-graded ancestry
 - b.) American animals of mixed Galloway, Belted Galloway, and/or White Galloway ancestry.
- 1992 First Canadian source White Galloways entered in 'Section III: White Galloways' of the Canadian Galloway Herd Book. The first is 'Cross Triangle White Lass 24W (Blk) -20W- FS'. ■

A FEW NOTES ON WHITE CATTLE

By Bev Onufer

The subject of White Galloways having come up several times during this past year, I decided to do a bit of research into their origins and to try and differentiate between the White Galloway and the other British Whites. I was fortunate to get information from two breeders who are actively involved in raising White Galloways.

Christopher Marler of England states: BRITISH WHITE - Polled, dual-purpose breed. Developed in East Anglia, i.e. Nor-folk and Suffolk. Black or red points. Tall

and rangey

WHITE PARK - Horned breed. Similar to ancient White Cattle of Britain and most likely their present day descendants. Mostly bred today for beef. Black points. WHITE GALLOWAY - Polled, shaggycoated in winter. First reference in Rev. Storers' book in about 1800. Died out about 1820 and then rediscovered in 1918. Black, dun or red points. Herd book started in 1982. Inspection procedure for Foundation Herd Book. Similar to Black Galloway in looks but probably a better milker, quicker grower owing to the hybrid vigour. In-troduced from British White, Beef Shorthorn and Galloway breeds during the course of it's development.

Kent Keith of Australia writes:

WHITE GALLOWAYS - There are a few herds in England and I know of one in the U.S. To the best of my knowledge they are first recorded in 1919. I consider that they were a cross with either British White or Park Cattle with Galloway

The first year I had British Whites I used a black Galloway bull and the resultant calf was what is known as a white Galloway - Galloway conformation with

the black points and polled.

In the UK the Galloway Soc. won't have them but they are registered with the Belted Galloway Soc. (Belties have

separate Soc.)

Black Galloways sometimes produce red calves. (similar say to a Red Poll) One of our past Soc. Presidents had a few so there is now a section in the herd book for Red Galloways - and also a section for other colours - no doubt if anyone in Aust. wanted to register White Galloways this is the section that would cater for them.

After 65 years of breeding, providing they kept within the colour range it would be hard to prove that White Galloways are

not pure bred.

I can see many problems arising as we have in Aust. now with the Belted Galloway. A Beltie/Black Galloway cross will give approx. 50% of the calves good beltie colour while the others have a patch of white where normally the belt should be. I have one such cow with one white spot approx. 6 inches across. She has just calved to a white milking Shorthorn and has a magnificent black Beltie calf - I'd defy anyone to pick that it wasn't a pure bred. I do think that it will turn Blue/Grey later.

I've also got a couple of Silver Dun Belties - look like silver duns but with a cross light you can just make out the belt. BRITISH WHITE - Origin - Way Back. White cattle with black ears, muzzle, hooves with black coat above hooves - and cows have black teats. And polled. The black can be replaced with red. Have their own Society - both colours OK.

PARK CATTLE -The wild cattle that roamed England in the 12th Century. Similar colour to the others but have a magnificent set of horns. Two of the original fenced in herds are still in ex-

Chillingham Park herd - very run down, poor nutrition and lack medication as they like to consider them as wild animals.

The other herd - Chartley, was fenced in within the Needwood forest in 1248. The Earls of Fearer(?) have had them since that time. Large magnificent cattle - the bulls go over the ton. We bought a Chartley bull calf in June.

In the US they have a Society called the British White Park Cattle but I think they

only have polled animals.

In Australia we have the British White Cattle Society of Australia and again they

will only accept polled cattle.

The cattle in Chillingham Park are all red pigmentation - a previous keeper didn't like the black points and shot all

those born with black points.

According to UK breeders, if you use a Park bull on Galloway all progeny are Park colour (true colour). With a British White only a small percentage turn out good colour on the white cross.

If one uses a Park bull on Black Galloways and providing the resultant calves are polled, it would be possible to get a herd of White Galloways in one generation.

We have been using British White bulls on Galloways for years now and most calves are mottled. Black for Black cows and Dun for Duns. There is a lot of hybrid vigour and they are certainly good cattle for the trade. At the local sale yards they are sold by auction at cents per Kilo and then weighed after the sale. Several times the buyers have asked for a reweigh as they are much heavier than they look

Using a British White bull over the White cross we get a good proportion of true colour British White except these may be a dark "Wash" on the neck.

In addition to the above information, I found an article entitled "A Note on the History of Black-eared White Cattle" by Lucia Pearson, in a copy of the British Agricultural History Review (Vol. 16

Pearson states that "In South America the black-eared white colour pattern is confined to the Blanco Orejinegro (BON) which inhabit the Andean region of Colombia and were estimated to numer 21/2 million in 1955. The coat is white but black flecks occur in some individuals, especially on the lower neck and flanks. Apart from black ears, the breed had black mucosae, feet, and horn tips. A recessive variant exists called the Blanco Orejimono which is identical except that black is replaced by a reddish colour.

She goes on to say that the "BON most closely resemble the oldest Wild White herds in Britain...however differs from all others in that it's calves are born white, never black or coloured." Pearson feels that the white cattle were brought to South America by Spaniards from descendants of the white cattle brought to Britain by the

Roman Legionaries

She gives a list of the breeds and types of cattle in which the above pattern may be found: "British White and Wild White, Columbian Blanco Orejinegro, East African Boran, Mauritius Creole, Nigerian White Fulani, North Finnish, Polish Marsh, and Swedish Mountain. The colour of the Norwegian Black-sided Trondheim and Nordland and the South African Nguni is often reduced to white with black points including the ears.

I think we can conclude that White cattle with black or red points are not as rare as we have been led to think. Further research would, I am sure, turn up many more interesting facts on this subject but time and space limits my curiosity, for


