I guess everyone found positives and negatives about the country's time in lockdown due to Covid-19, and we all know that the results will be felt for a very long time indeed across the whole country, and around the world.

But.. life must carry on and I'm sure our parents and grandparents faced many similar challenges in their lifetimes also, and we have all heard stories about some of these and how resourceful they became to face these challenges.

AGM - As you will be aware our 2020 AGM and Herd Tour in Christchurch in early April had to be postponed, and due to the continuing challenges due to Covid-19, the Council have recently decided, that to meet our legal requirements for 2020, we will hold an AGM and dinner only on Saturday 5 September at the Jet Park Hotel, Hamilton Airport. We had expected that more breeders would have taken the opportunity to advertise their stud/s, but only a small number did, so perhaps that is something to be considered for the 2020 Annual Gazette to be published later this year. An exception to this was the article sent in by Estelle Taylor at my request for a junior members perspective, it was well written, included photos, and the Council appreciated the time and effort that she put into it. Thank you Estelle.

PROMOTION – In addition to the Southern Galloway Breeders Group taking part in the Southern Field Days in February, the Society has also placed adverts in the Canterbury Rare Breeds Auction catalogue (March), Countrywide Beef (May), and the Southland Farmers 2020-2021 Wallplanner (May). The total cost to the Society for these promotions was about \$2500.

Both Roger Brownlee and I spent time at the Southern Field Days site, and both agree with those Southern members that held the meeting on the Friday that it was rather quiet this year and seemed removed from the busier areas at field days. Perhaps in future it may be

possible to find a smaller site closer to the main areas of activity, as the current site seemed too large and not fully utilised.

MEMBERSHIP – We have a good number of new members joining the Society in most areas, and considerable time and effort goes into assisting these new members and answering their questions. If you are selling some of your registered Galloways to non-members, we hope that you will encourage them to consider joining the Society as breeder members, so they can start a herd and record/register the progeny etc.
