Virginia Poole

I was fortunate to grow up on our family dairy farm in Onewhero. I have always had a love of the land. Originally the farm was stocked with Jersey cows as we were on the cream run. We also had a piggery that took care of the whey. Later the farm became a town supply so Dad gradually changed the herd over to Friesian cows. I left the farm when I married Jeff and moved to the big city. Certainly, a change of scenery and tempo.

After a few years of marriage, we managed to buy 10 acres in Helensville, much to my delight. Here we farmed a few beef cattle and a few sheep, plus we leased some land in Muriwai to carry another 20-odd beef cattle. This was a lot of fun and we both enjoyed it so much that we decided that we needed to raise more money to buy a bigger property, we decided the quickest way was to lease a pub. Which we did in Kihikihi (The Alpha). Certainly, a very big change in lifestyle, especially as we had our two children in tow.

After 4 years we had an Aha moment and in 1985, decided to move to Australia. We lived in Brisbane for 10 years. During this time, I started a Muffin business. I sold healthy muffins to gyms and cafes for 4 years. Hard work and I don't think I have made a muffin since. We moved back to New Zealand in 1995 and after a couple of years, we started Fine Wine Delivery Company which we still own today.

Before Covid, I would organize Wine Tours in Europe, South America, and Australia. As we are in the wine business, we were able to open many vineyard doors that would otherwise be closed. We no longer do the tours, however, I still look after the 100 private wine cellars we have at our Lunn Ave Mt Wellington location. Sarah Pinfold - Riverview White Galloway's

I first fell in love with these beautiful animals in a paddock while staying in Te Kauwhata back in 2004, and then again after seeing a cow and her calf at the Central District Field Days. So when the opportunity of purchasing some stock from the "Lifestyle Stud" came up I knew this was my chance to start a new hobby!

I am a born & bred farm girl! Growing up on a dairy farm at Woodville, I spent a lot of my time as a child with Dad on the farm. While at primary school I participated in many pet days. After leaving school I ended up working in retail for many years, before moving into Call Centre work where I worked my way up to a Team Leader & trainer role, but I always enjoyed returning to the farm to help out on my weekends.

For the past 15 years, I have been Sharemilking on a family farm at Mangatainoka in Northern Wairarapa, milking 230 Friesian cows. The farm is generally flat but there are some gully & creak areas that we don't graze with the dairy stock, this is where the Galloway's come in handy. During the winter & if it's a dry summer their feed is limited but they don't seem to lose any conditions! Actually, I don't think you can have a skinny Galloway.

Riverview White Galloway Stud was formed in 2008 after I purchased 3 yearling Heifers & an R2 Bull from Mike & Lorraine Clifford. Originally I was only planning on purchasing the 3 heifers but on the way home from viewing them it suddenly dawn on me that I would need a bull if I was going to breed from these girls! So after a phone call that evening to Lorraine I also added "Lifestyle David" to my delivery.

My Galloway herd now numbers 27, of which 14 are breeding cows. The Bull I'm currently using is Kahala Bruno, he is undermarked but produces some well-marked calves this year. Over Bulls I have used over the years have been Stoney Brook Milo, Alclutha Evan and Suncrest Arctic Flynn, so my herd has quite a diverse ancestry. Over the years I have used bulls I have bred over my Dairy cows, with good results with the Frisian/Galloway X calves always in demand.

While my daughter Ella was at Primary school I was Board Chair for 6 years, and involved in planning and running many fundraising events. Hopefully, the future will see me being less involved with the day-to-day running of the Dairy farm, maybe moving to some land where I can continue to increase my Galloway family and spend more time with them.





Jillian May Maxwell-Strang

I was born in 1970 and lived just outside Invercargill. On the land, I began my love of animals and started exhibiting guinea pigs, dairy goats and poultry. I joined the Invercargill Poultry & Pigeon Club and when I finished school I went through the Farm Cadet Scheme and worked on Dairy, Sheep & Beef farms. I got married in 1989 and started full-time dairy farming and I became a mum to two beautiful baby daughters in these early years and joined WDFF.

We worked through the dairy system from a married couple, lower order sharemilkers, 50/50 sharemilking to farm ownership. I milked and reared calves over these years and was an active member on A & P Assn committees and participated in Floral Art.

I got divorced in 2008 and bought a property of 16 acres and started the Rosemay Belted Galloway Stud with 4 females from the Jacobs family of the West Coast and a cow from Carol Miller of Canterbury. I borrowed a bull from Rob Hall and joined the Southern Galloway Breeders Group. While on this place I worked as a Kitchen Cook, an Electoral Field Worker and a Relief Milker.

I met Linton Strang in 2011 and in 2016 we moved 16 breeding cows and young stock to 50 acres, that were part of his family farm at Waimatuku, Western Southland. Also in 2016 we went to the World Galloway Congress in Scotland and saw Red Belted Galloways for the first time. When we came home from this trip I found my first Red Belted Galloway calf down in the calving mob, such a surprise, I couldn't believe it. We have increased the herd up to 30 breeding cows now and have black and red Belted Galloways. In March 2021 I married Linton.

At present, I still breed and exhibit poultry and I'm a Judge of Heavy Breed Poultry, Waterfowl and Eggs. currently hold several positions in the Invercargill Poultry & Pigeon Club and NZ (SI) Poultry, Pigeon & Cage Bird Association. I am the Secretary/Treasurer for the Southern Galloway Breeders Group, a member and past President of Thornbury Rural Women and I have just finished two months working as a Census Collector. I still relief milk and rear 300 calves on a dairy farm around the road from us.

I am enjoying increasing the Red belted numbers in our herd and I hope to see more of them around in the future.

I found 7 Galloway crosses that had had their first calves they were all so pretty when we viewed them they had a pedigree bull so we thought why not. The Galloways all produce beautiful calves and are fabulous mothers, we now have 14 cows and a sometimes frustrated bull.

We love having them to watch and they also do well for the freezer 105 acres in Warkworth, a small flat paddock 8 acres rest rolling to hilly quite wet which is why we chose Galloway as they keep their condition and forage not fussy eaters.

I have also held a position on a school board. I work with my husband and his business partner since 2003 as the office manager with 18 employees. I am also responsible for the payroll, GST and I use Zero on a daily basis.
