Breeder Susan Nicol, welcomes the birth of imported belted embryos to her Forest View stud at Ohaupo in April. We welcome the new blood line from USA, introduced to NZ. These calves are born with size and length, and birth weights ranging from 37kgs to 50kgs, but still with the easy calving trait renowned with the Galloway Breed.

Be sure to visit the Mystery Creek Fielddays, 10th - 13th June in Hamilton, to see these calves.

If you have a registerable R2 appendix bull for sale or lease, do let me know, as currently our little experiment is on hold until we locate a bull. I will keep you posted on the outcome of this.



Imported Bloodline for Forest View Stud

It all started on aeroplane to Melbourne. Eric and I sat next to Lindsay Jones of Seedsock Marketing. We just got talking, as you do, about dairy and beef cows, and Eric mentioned I had an interest in Belted Galloways. Lindsay told us of his contacts in the UK, Canada and the USA and if we wanted, he could have a look and see what he could find for us.

So 3 years later, I still had his phone number and called him. I told him what we were looking for in the way of traits, where my most important one was their temperament.




Lindsay got back to us with some Sires and Dams to choose from. We selected Sire Aldermere Ajax (above) and Dam FSB Warrior Nancy. (pictured below).



In July 2014, the embryos were implanted into 10 of our carry over dairy cows by Nigel Juby of Ova-Achievers Ltd. Two months later we had the cows pregnancy tested. To our delight, 9 of the 10 cows were holding their calves.

On Friday 17 April my first Belted Galloway heifer calf was born. It was very exciting. Since then 6 more have calved and we are still waiting for the last two.



I never expected there to be such a big gap between the birth dates of the calves. But this is all good, I have more time to spend playing with the calves.

We will also DNA profile my calves to verify that they indeed have the markers that were sent to us with all the paperwork. I like to DNA profile all my stock to eliminate any human errors.

As the dams of these calves are dairy cows, I am hand rearing the calves so we can milk the cows. I have found that these calves are extremely quiet and very easy to spend too much time with them.

~ Virtual Show 2015 ~ Judged by Sharron Patterson

Laurie and I have been breeding and selling Big Rugged Hereford bulls here at Waikaka Southland. Our philosophy is *Performance Driven... Manageable Birthweights + More Manageable Milk + More Growth.*

We farm a 730 hectare flat rolling stud farm, where we been farming here together for over 30 years, along with our son Ross and his wife Steph who moved back to the farm in 2009, and their 2 young children, who are showing promising signs of becoming 6th generation farmers on our Greenvale property.

I have been called upon to judge all breeds classes throughout New Zealand and have seen a huge improvement in all breeds. "Breeders are now breeding for the Beef market, not just for the sale yards"

I was very excited about been approached to judge your Galloway Society yearly Virtual Show, and I think the concept is a terrific idea, and perhaps more societies will take this on.

I think, most of your cattle I saw would have given some of the classes I judged at cattle shows, a real run for their money.

The animals presented in the photos were very well balanced, strong structured and very meaty. I would like mentioned that most photos were very good, some just needed to be more focused and or closer. A few I was not as comfortable placing as due to the photo I was unable to compare rump width or muzzle width etc., so I felt that all animals were very well worth mentioning as of been of a very high standard, I am very impressed.

Some classes took me over 20 minutes to decide. I would like to congratulate all the winners tonight and congratulate all the Galloway Breeders for producing such a high class type of beef cattle.

My judging criteria;

Calves; the heifers should show femininity and softness, the bulls need to have a muscular look about them. Both need to be showing thickness all the way through and width across the back and rump. Muzzle is important they need to be able to eat well in order to grow well.

Yearlings; this is the beginning of their breeding career, I'm looking for the same traits as the calves, but also focusing on overall balance, good legs and feet.

Cows; Balance, good feet and spring of rib to name a few, in a class of mixed aged cows I take into consideration the age of the cow, an older cow, has not gotten to a ripe old age just by looking pretty in the real world, she has worked for her keep. A good sound udder and teats are paramount, it's a waste of a good calf if it struggles to feed on an udder low to the ground or teats too big for it to fit in its mouth. Not too much laying fat in the brisket, this can lead to a poor milker and cows carrying too much condition can lead to numerous problems.

Mature Bulls; again just as the rest, straightness, width, length and balance. I focus also on the muscle tone of the bulls. Again I do not like heavy bulls both in bone structure and in fat. Scrotum size and Balance.

I hope you are happy with my judging, and I would again like to thank you for inviting me to be involved in your 2015 Virtual show, all the best and enjoy your night.
